Truckee River Operating Agreement

After more than 25 years of negotiation and environmental studies, the Truckee River Operating Agreement (TROA) will go into effect by the end of this year. To Reno, Sparks and Washoe County residents, this means that upstream drought storage and drought reserves will nearly triple over time.

TROA solves several long-standing interstate, federal and regional disputes over the timing and use of Truckee River water. It also replaces an old and inflexible river management system. It does so by providing more efficient use of available reservoir storage and releases to meet modern-day demands. This includes the water needs of our community, as well as recreational uses and instream and wildlife needs for the entire river ecosystem.

"We have waited a very long time for TROA to be completed and it could not come at a more opportune time," said Geno Martini, TMWA Board of Directors Chairman. "The agreement is the biggest and most important piece of TMWA's drought management plan as it will triple the amount of water storage for the Truckee Meadows in drought years. This is an absolute game changer for our community."

2015 Community Conservation Report

Starting May 1, 2015, we asked our customers to reduce their water use by at least 10% through the summer, because of the prolonged drought. We faced numerous challenges. Last winter's snowpack that feeds our water supply was the worst in recorded history. We also had the fifth warmest August and fourth warmest September on record. It was a challenging season, but...

Turned off your sprinklers when it rained
