- May is the time to prepare your turf for the summer ahead. Please review the following recommendations that can help you save water:
- Short and more frequent watering times promote and create a deep, healthy root system.
- If you water your lawn and runoff occurs, cut the time by two-minute increments until runoff stops. This will help you establish how many minutes you should be watering for every interval. If your lawn is dry, add two minutes. Most lawns can thrive on six-minute watering cycles.
- The best times to water your lawn are late at night or early in the morning when the ground and air temperatures are cool. Please do not water your lawn during the hottest part of the day: noon – 6 p.m.
- Spring aerating helps relieve the compaction in the soil and allows the water to get deep into the root system.
- Please do not water when it's raining or windy.

### **Our Water Supply Is in Good Shape:**

### PLEASE USE WATER RESPONSIBLY

As the summer season approaches, many people are wondering about the status of our water supply. We had a moderate recovery this winter and spring thanks to the many recent snow and rain storms. The good news is that we will not have to use our upstream reserves this year. During last summer and fall, following the driest winter on record, we only used 40 percent of our reserves, thanks to the community responding to our request for a 10 percent reduction in water use. In addition, the long—anticipated Truckee River Operating Agreement was implemented in December. This means that we will go into this summer with 48 percent more upstream reserves than we had going into last summer: or about 40.000 acre feet.

This irrigation season, even though our water supplies are in fantastic shape, we are asking our customers to continue to use water responsibly. And please remember, Assigned Day Watering is always in effect. A home or business has three outside watering days each week.

#### REMEMBER

- Odd addresses: If the last number in your address is 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9, water on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays.
- Even addresses: If the last number in your address is 0, 2, 4, 6 or 8, water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.
- On Mondays, please don't water as it is a day for the water system to recover.
- Please do not water during the hottest part of the day: noon 6 p.m.

At TMWA we are dedicated to encouraging responsible water use and helping our customers prevent unnecessary waste. If you see water being wasted, please let us know by calling the conservation department at 834-8005. Many customers, whether business or residential, simply do not realize they have a leak or broken sprinkler head. Those customers who waste water will be contacted so that we can assist them in resolving the issue.

Rest assured that our community is better prepared than ever before to manage our water supplies during drought cycles. We can meet the demands of our water customers through this summer without the use of upstream reserves. ### Please keep your trees in mind when caring for your landscaping

Trees need our attention during spring and summer. The best way to water trees is to give them a good slow soaking at least once a week starting in the spring through late fall. When it gets really hot, watering twice a week is advisable. Run a soaker hose or sprinkler at low volume so that the soil is soaked past the branch spread of trees.

Visit <u>www.communityforestry.org</u> for tree care tips for our region. If you are concerned about the health of your trees, TMWA offers free tree evaluations conducted by an arborist. Call the conservation department at 834-8005 to schedule an appointment.



### **How Can You Identify TMWA Employees?**

During the height of the watering and construction season, TMWA employees are more visible while working in the community. Customers often ask us how they can be sure these workers are really TMWA employees. All of our vehicles are clearly marked with the TMWA logo and our personnel always carry a security badge. We encourage customers to ask an employee for his/her badge if it is not clearly visible. If an individual does not produce a badge for your viewing, he/she is not a TMWA employee. In very rare instances, TMWA employees may ask if they can take a sample of your water. However, TMWA does not sell water filters or water purification systems for your home and our employees will never request or take a payment at your home.

Also, if you receive an unsolicited telephone call asking for a payment on your TMWA account, please take down the telephone number, refuse to make a payment and call local law enforcement or TMWA at (775) 834-8080. The only valid methods of paying your TMWA bill are listed at <a href="www.tmwa.com">www.tmwa.com</a>, and the only valid telephone number to pay over the phone is TMWA's main customer service line at (775) 834-8080.
