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TURF ※TALK

In cooperation with the University of Nevada Cooperative Extension and the Nevada Landscane Association

- As we continue into our fourth year of drought, it's important that you condition your turf to better tolerate our unusually-dry conditions.
- Inspect. Check your sprinkler system for clogged, broken or missing sprinkler heads.
- Connect. Examine points where the sprinkler heads connect to pipes or hoses. If you see water pooling in your landscape or you have large wet areas, you could have a leak in your system. A leak as small as the tip of a pen (1/32nd of the inch) can waste about 6,000 gallons of water per month, according to EPA's WaterSense.
- Adjust. July is usually a hot month. If you see your grass wilting, don't make your run times longer, but add another cycle instead.

Check here monthly for timely landscaping and watering tips.

To find out how customers and TMWA are doing saving water this summer, visit **tmws.com/save**. Scroll to the savings gauge on the last page, where we will post results. For instance, as of press time for this newsletter, we had posted results for the month of May. Water production was 19% lower compared to May 2013, which is the baseline-use year. That's over 1,500 acre-feet, or approximately half a billion gallons, in water savings.

That is great news, because any water we save this summer is water we can use next year, should we need it.
