NOW IS THE BEST TIME TO DETECT A LEAK

SAVE WATER And Save on Your Bill

Do you have undetected leaks? Now is a great time to track down and eliminate water leaks in your home as you shut down all outdoor watering for the season. How would vou know if vou have a leak? A good place to start is your water bill. Examine your water usage information after your outdoor watering is shut down. A typical family of four uses about 6,000 gallons indoors a month. If your indoor usage significantly exceeds this, you may have a leak. A handy rule of thumb is that an average wintertime water bill should be no more than about thirty dollars. Common types of leaks found in the home are faucets and toilet flappers. Visit www.tmwa.com/conservation for tips and videos on how to detect leaks and fix toilet and faucet leaks. GET READY FOR THE COLD WEATHER:

WINTERIZE YOUR HOME AND AVOID FROZEN PIPES

As temperatures drop in November, you can avoid the expense and trouble of frozen water lines. Just follow these simple precautions before the cold weather sets in:



- If you have not already done so, shut off and drain your irrigation system. Disconnect and drain all outdoor hoses as well. We've created a short video to guide you through the process at: www.tmwa.com/howto.
- Insulate pipes or faucets in unheated areas. If you have water pipes
 in an unheated garage or crawl space under the house, wrap them
 before temperatures plummet. Hardware and home improvement
 stores offer appropriate pipe wrapping tape.
- Close the foundation or exterior vents around your house, seal off cracks, and repair broken basement windows to help keep cold air out. Cold winter winds whistling through overlooked openings can quickly freeze exposed water pipes. However, avoid plugging air vents that your furnace or water heater need for safe operation.
- Keep garage doors closed to reduce exposure of water lines to cold temperatures.
- During periods of hard freezes, or when you are away from your home for an extended period of time, set your thermostat to a temperature that will keep your pipes from freezing: no lower than 55°F.
- Know the location of your master water shutoff valve. In many homes, it is where the water line comes into your house from the street. If a pipe bursts anywhere in the house—kitchen, bath, basement or crawl space—this valve turns off all water and can help save your home from water damage. So, find it now and paint it a bright color or hang a tag on it. Be sure everyone in the family knows where it is. See our video on how to locate your master shutoff valve at: www.tmwa.com/howto.

RapidPay-Electronic Funds Transfer: You never have to worry about paying your bill on time with this convenient service. With

RapidPay, we mail your water bill as usual and your payment amount will be automatically deducted from your checking account on the day the bill is due. And, because TMWA's handling costs are less, we credit your water bill 21 cents. Pay Online: You can pay online with no additional charges by using your checking account or by credit card with a \$2.50 convenience fee charged by the vendor. To set up your account or make a one-time payment, go to www.tmwa.com and click on the Login button in the upper right-hand corner.

Pay by Phone: TMWA provides an automated payment system available via telephone. Simply call (775) 834-8080. This system allows you to pay your TMWA account 24 hours a day. There is no transaction fee if you use your bank account. If you choose to use your credit card, a \$2.50 convenience fee is charged by the vendor for this service.
