"Leave No Trace" – Outdoor Ethics

Keep these seven "Leave No Trace" principles in mind when you are paddling, tubing, fishing, hiking, or biking and reduce your impact on the Truckee River.

- 1 Plan ahead and prepare.** Unnecessary impact can be avoided by careful preparations. Know the area and what to expect: potential weather, river conditions, and regulations.
- 2 Travel and recreate on durable surfaces.** Use established sites and parks as indicated on the map. Avoid making new trails.
- 3 Dispose of waste properly.** Pick up and pack out all of your litter. Trash and litter have no place on river corridors. Set a good example—pick up litter left by others.

4 Leave what you find. Allow others a sense of discovery by leaving rocks, plants, archaeological artifacts and other objects of interest as you find them.

5 Minimize campfire impacts. Use established fire rings or barbeque grills provided in the parks.

6 Respect wildlife. Natural fauna needs plenty of space and undisturbed habitat for breeding, raising young, and feeding.

7 Be considerate of other visitors. Respect others and practice good river etiquette to ensure that everyone enjoys their river recreation.
