SHREWD DEBT MANAGEMENT SAVES OVER \$50 MILLION SINCE TMWA'S INCEPTION

TMWA has saved tens of millions of dollars since its inception by remaining vigilant and nimble in the management of its longterm debt. The bulk of TMWA's debt came in 2001, when the City of Reno, the City of Sparks, and Washoe County (RSW) partnered to purchase the water utility from Sierra Pacific Power Company (Sierra) for \$354M.

In September of 2000, Sierra announced it would sell its water business, ending over a century in which the company or its direct predecessors operated both power and water in our community. Local leaders faced the possibility of our region's primary water provider being sold to an out-of-state company. This wouldn't necessarily have been a bad thing, but they judged water to be too essential for our community to leave it to chance.

In October of 2000, RSW submitted a joint proposal to purchase the water utility from Sierra. Shortly after, Truckee Meadows Water Authority (TMWA) was born.

To purchase the utility, over \$452M in revenue-backed bonds were sold—\$354M to purchase the water and hydroelectric assets from Sierra with the remainder used for improvements to the water system, capital reserves, staffing, and operational costs (insurance, office space, computers, desks, etc.). TMWA was literally starting from scratch and a lot needed to be done in a very short time.

"The 2001 bonds were basically the mortgage on the house," said Michele Sullivan, TMWA's chief financial officer. "TMWA has taken on additional debt since its inception—rising to a peak of a little over \$556M in 2008—but that first bond issuance has always represented the bulk of what we had to manage. When you're dealing with hundreds of millions of dollars in debt, interest rates can make a profound cost difference over the life of the loan or, in TMWA's case, the period before a bond series matures and must be repaid."

"TMWA's finance team has always been very proactive in finding opportunities to refund older bond series by issuing newer ones at a lower interest rate," Sullivan explained. "By doing this, we've lowered our cost-of-debt obligation by well over \$50M since TMWA was founded."

Since 2015, TMWA's long-term debt has been reduced by over \$76M. This has been largely due to the premiums TMWA has earned on its lower-interest bond issuances.

"Though we are a public agency, from day one, TMWA has prided itself on operating like a business," said Sullivan. "The way we manage our bond debt is a prime example of this. Our debt management policy requires that we realize at least three percent savings before we can do a refunding. We've almost always done better than that. The bottom line for our customers is that lower interest rates mean a lower cost of operations, which, in turn, can help keep water rates as low as possible."

GET A FUN SUMMER JOB: JOIN TMWA'S SUMMER CONSERVATION STAFF

Annual hiring for TMWA's seasonal water conservation consultant team will begin in March. We provide the training, vehicle, and equipment; you become a true champion for water conservation programs in the Truckee Meadows. Responsibilities include educating the public on TMWA's water conservation and assigned-day watering rules, looking for leaks in sprinkler systems, and responding to water-waste reports.

We've found that most people with leaks and other outdoor watering problems don't even know they have them. Our conservation consultants' mission is to identify these problems and help our customers find a solution—and save water.

If you're friendly, organized, and a good communicator, this job may be for you. This is a temporary, full-time position—not to exceed 1,039 hours of employment in a year. The job starts in April and ends in October.
