6. <u>DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE DIRECTION TO STAFF REGARDING THE SCHEDULING OF</u> <u>MEETINGS OF TMWA AND WRWC'S CONCURRENT LEGISLATIVE SUBCOMMITTEE</u>

The Members discussed the best days and times to schedule the meetings and to hold them as needed to update the respective Subcommittees.

Upon motion duly made by Member Anderson, seconded by Chair Duerr, and carried unanimously, the TMWA and WRWC Subcommittees approved the meeting schedule, both in-person and virtual, of the TMWA and WRWC's Concurrent Legislative Subcommittee to be held on Fridays at 2:00pm.

7. <u>PRESENTATION OF STATUS REPORT ON LEGISLATION OF INTEREST TO TMWA AND</u> <u>POSSIBLE DIRECTION REGARDING TMWA'S POSITION</u>

Dan Nubel, TMWA Staff Attorney, reported that there were over 900 Bill Draft Request (BDRs) and over 500 Bills, of which TMWA is tracking 92 and 131, respectively. Of the Bills TMWA is monitoring, AB51 (relates to public records and allows governmental entities to charge a reasonable fee for personnel and tech resources to fulfill the request), AB120 (agencies to assess the economic impact of a proposed regulation), SB2 (relates to open meeting law and collective bargaining discussions), and SB71 (relates to purchasing and establishes a Nevada Diverse Business Advisory Council). Leo

Drozdoff, TMWA Government Affairs Consultant, provided an overview on SB36 (establishes the Nevada Water Buy-Back Initiative and the Advisory Committee) and AB104, formerly referred to as the Omnibus Bill, (requires the State Engineer to retire certain water rights, revises provisions related to temporary permits to appropriate groundwater, and creating an account for retiring water rights), both bills are linked, but staff is recommending support for AB104 at this time.

Upon motion duly made by Chair Duerr, seconded by Member Anderson, and carried unanimously, the TMWA Subcommittee accepted staff recommendation to support AB104.

8. <u>PRESENTATION OF STATUS REPORT ON LEGISLATION OF INTEREST TO WRWC AND</u> <u>POSSIBLE DIRECTION REGARDING WRWC'S POSITION. THIS ITEM MAY BE</u> <u>COMBINED WITH ITEM 7.</u>

Lucas Foletta, WRWC General Counsel noted that WRWC Staff are monitoring the PFAS Bill, SB76 (from the 2023 session), and will report on its status accordingly. He also reported that WRWC Staff is monitoring AB 104 but is not recommending action at this time as WRWC's interests as a planning agency are not directly implicated.

No motion was taken.

9. SUBCOMMITTEE COMMENTS

Chair Duerr thanked staff for all the information and suggested adding Zoom for future meetings.

10. STAFF COMMENTS

There were no staff comments.
